









At day 180, either the child must be returned to the custodial parent or a petition must be filed. California statute defines voluntary placement in WIC 16507.4,16507.6, and 11401.1. Federal authority to pay IV-E for voluntary placements is in 42 USC 672 (a)(2)(A) and in (f) and (g). In California, a voluntary placement is considered voluntary Family Reunification (FR). A case plan is required and the parent is provided FR services in order to resolve the issue requiring placement in the 180-day period.
