Please implement the SEC recommendations. The work the SEC accomplished reinforces so much of what judges and staff throughout the state have been articulating for many years; that the AOC is mismanaged, dysfunctional and deceitful.

Exorbitant pensions, faux furloughs, disinformation regarding staffing levels, poor management, the failed \$700 million CCMS experiment, and even lobbing to deprive judges of their ability to select their own presiding judges are just a few examples that the AOC's priorities are to acquire power for the sake of power and to control the trial courts rather than serve the citizens of the state and its trial courts.

Unfortunately, the SEC report falls short in assessing how AOC was allowed to morph into

this bureaucratic juggernaut. That responsibility falls squarely on the shoulders of the Judicial Council.
