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Executive Summary

The Administrative Office of the Courts submits to the Judicial Council four options for review and consideration for funding one-time and ongoing operational and security costs for the remodeled Superior Court of El Dorado County juvenile facility that is expected to open on June 11, 2012. The council had previously approved funding for this facility, but it has taken longer than expected for the work to be completed.

Recommendation

The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) recommends that the Judicial Council consider the following options (as displayed in Attachment A) and determine what action to take with regard to the Superior Court of El Dorado County's request for funding for their remodeled juvenile facility that is to be completed in June 2012:

1. **Option 1—Approve the court's current funding request.** Distribute a total of \$292,380 (\$95,128 in one-time and \$197,252 in ongoing funding) from the Trial Court Trust Fund (TCTF) to address operating (\$106,888) and security staffing (\$185,492) costs;

- 2. **Option 2—Approve modified funding request.** Distribute a total of \$257,512 (\$81,128 in one-time and \$176,384 in ongoing funding) from the TCTF to address operating (\$92,888) and security staffing (\$164,624) costs;
- 3. **Option 3—Approve ongoing funding request only.** Distribute a total of \$176,384 in ongoing funding from the TCTF to address ongoing operating (\$11,760) and security staffing (\$164,624) costs; or
- 4. **Option 4—Deny the court's funding request.** Do not distribute any funding to the court.

Previous Council Action

During fiscal years (FY) 2005–2006 through 2008–2009, the Judicial Council approved using a limited amount of funding from the State Appropriations Limit or Consumer Price Index adjustment process to address operating and staffing costs (including entrance screening security) for new, remodeled, or transferring trial court facilities. Courts were instructed to complete a survey form if they had a facility for which they would need operating or staffing costs that would open or transfer from county to state ownership during that fiscal year or within three months following the end of the fiscal year. Courts were required to provide information about the types of furniture/equipment and personnel needs they had for the facility and the related costs. AOC staff from various divisions reviewed the requests applying Judicial Council–approved criteria and provided recommendations to the Trial Court Budget Working Group (TCBWG). The TCBWG made a recommendation to the Administrative Director of the Courts, who subsequently submitted a report to the Judicial Council seeking approval for the funding.

At its October 10, 2008, business meeting, the Judicial Council approved \$168,722 in one-time and \$178,211 in ongoing funding for costs associated with the remodel of the El Dorado Juvenile Hall to include a new juvenile courtroom and executive offices. Based on the report to the council, work was to be completed on the facility and it was to open for use by September 30, 2009.

Rationale for Recommendation

The Superior Court of El Dorado County contacted AOC Finance Division staff approximately three times since the approval of the funding by the council to ask if the funding was still available. The original contact from the court was made in March 2009. The court wanted to know if the funding would be available if the facility didn't open until after June 30, 2009. They were told that the funding would be set aside beyond June 30, 2009, and, through inadvertent error, were not informed at that time that, consistent with Judicial Council direction, the funding would remain available only until September 30, 2009. The court subsequently asked for confirmation in August 2010 that the funds were still available. Again, at that time, AOC staff mistakenly informed the court that the funding was still available.

The court contacted the AOC again in early November 2011 asking if the funds were still available and indicating that the remodeling work had recently started and that they planned to

open the facility in spring 2012. At that time, AOC staff realized that, according to the funding process originally approved by the Judicial Council, the court technically was required to have opened the facility by September 2009 in order to receive the funding. The court was notified on January 31, 2012, of this requirement. The court was very concerned because they had relied on staff assurances that the funds were still available and had not taken steps to set aside funding to address these costs. Staff realizes that the AOC does not have the authority to allocate these funds and that this request should come before the current Judicial Council for its consideration.

The court informed AOC staff that the reason for the delay in completing the project was that the space in the county building was offered to the court in exchange for space in the court's South Lake Tahoe facility. An equity space agreement and memorandum of understanding between the AOC and the County had to be prepared and this took two and a half years to complete. The court then had to have a full design prepared. The court also informed staff that the use of the facility had changed somewhat from the original design. As originally submitted, the court planned to have a juvenile courtroom, support staff, and court administrative offices located in the facility. The eventual design is for the facility to have a juvenile delinquency, juvenile dependency, and traffic court with support staff and no administration offices.

Changes in the design were needed based on the following:

- In 2010, one of two of the court commissioner positions in the court was converted to a judgeship. The judge appointed and now assigned to the traffic and juvenile calendars does not have his own dedicated courtroom, chambers, or secure access to the traffic hearing room. The judge's main office is located at 2850 Fairlane Court, Placerville and is within the general court administration suite of offices and cubicles. The judge must travel to the court located at 495 Main Street, Placerville three days a week to handle the juvenile calendars and at the Main Street court he shares courtroom space with the family law judge and office space with mediators and settlement attorneys.
- Security concerns with traffic hearings and clerk's counter being in a shared use facility with no perimeter security.

As a result of these modifications in design, the court stated that they would submit updated estimates of costs that reflect these changes. Attachment A displays the items for which the court requested funding and then, for each item, (1) the original amount included in the overall recommendation approved by the Judicial Council on October 10, 2008, (2) the updated amount requested in February 2012 and subsequently revised in March by the court (Option 1), (3) an option to approve an amount that is based on previous practice in the new and remodeled facility process (Option 2), (4) an option to approve only ongoing costs (Option 3), and (5) an option to approve no funding (Option 4).

Summary of operational (non-security) component of funding request

The original operational funding approved by the Judicial Council for this remodeled facility in October 2008 was \$145,309. Of this amount, \$131,722 was one-time funding and the remaining

\$13,587 was ongoing. The court's March 2012 revised request contained in Option 1 is for \$106,888, \$95,128 of which is one-time in nature and \$11,760 ongoing. The modified amount reflected in Option 2 is for \$92,888 (\$81,128 one-time and \$11,760 ongoing). Option 3 contains only the ongoing portion of the request based on previous practice in this process which is \$11,760 and Option 4 contains no funding.

The primary reasons for the decrease in one-time costs from the October 2008 to the March 2012 request are that the facility will no longer host the court's executive offices meaning that the more expensive furniture and equipment (\$32,000) is no longer needed and the court no longer has a need for a PA system (\$15,000) in this facility. While the overall one-time cost did go down, some individual cost items did go up from the time of the original request and one brand new item – wiring for data/phones (\$14,000) which the court did not realize it would need at the time of the original FY 2008–2009 request – was included.

Consistent with past practice in reviews of these types of requests, if a previously approved cost item increased, but is reasonable, and the overall amount of the request is still below what was originally requested, the increased cost would be allowed. This is the case with a few items in the court's revised request. The largest change was in the cost for a filing system, which has increased from \$7,000 to \$16,464. The court indicated that this is the lowest bid that they received. Past practice, however, would not allow for funding of a new cost item, such as the wiring, that was not included in the original approved request. This item is, therefore, not included in Options 2 and 3.

There are two operational cost items for which ongoing funding has been requested – janitorial service and telephones. Both of the costs are lower than the original approved request. Past practice would support funding at the lower amount as indicated in Options 1, 2 and 3.

Summary of security component of funding request

The original security funding approved by the council for this remodeled facility in October 2008 was \$201,624. Of this amount, \$37,000 was one-time and \$164,624 ongoing funding. The court's March 2012 revised request for security-related costs contained in Option 1 is \$185,492 and the amount in Option 2 and 3 is \$164,624. These amounts are ongoing. The court was originally approved a maximum of \$37,000 in one-time funding for an x-ray machine and a magnetometer. Funding will not be needed for these items from this process, however, as the AOC's Office of Emergency Response and Security (OERS) will purchase a magnetometer for the court from its Trial Court Improvement Fund (TCIF) Court Security Grant Program budget, and has an x-ray machine available (originally purchased for another court but not needed now for that court) that will be provided to El Dorado.

The previous practice concerning ongoing security costs has been to maintain the funding level for security staff as of the fiscal year the funding was originally approved, rather than to update it by taking into account possible raises in salaries or benefits since that time. This has been the practice with the funding provided for the 101 new entrance screening stations funded through the Budget Acts of 2006 and 2007. This practice is maintained in Options 2 and 3.

Option 1 – Approve the court's current funding request

This option would distribute a total of \$292,380 (\$95,128 in one-time and \$197,252 in ongoing funding) from the TCTF to address operational (\$106,888) and security staffing (\$185,492) costs.

Pros:

- The court would receive sufficient one-time and ongoing funding to address their operational and security costs related to the remodeled facility.
- There would be no need for the court to use any of its fund balance for this purpose.

Cons:

- This allocation would reduce the available funds in the TCTF that could be used for other purposes.
- The funding that would be provided to the court is not consistent with past practices in this program.

Option 2 – Approve modified funding request

This option would distribute a total of \$257,512 (\$81,128 in one-time and \$176,384 in ongoing funding) from the TCTF to address operational (\$92,888) and security staffing (\$164,624) costs.

Pros:

- The court would receive a reasonable amount of funding for one-time and ongoing costs while past reimbursement practices are being maintained.
- The court would only need to use a minimal amount of its fund balance to address unreimbursed costs.

Cons:

- This allocation would reduce the available funds in the TCTF that could be used for other purposes.
- Some of the court's costs will not be fully reimbursed.

Option 3 – Approve ongoing funding request only

This option would distribute a total of \$176,384 in ongoing funding (\$11,760 for operational and \$164,624 for security staffing costs) from the TCTF.

Pros:

• Provides ongoing funding to the court that would be hard, if not impossible, for it to have been able to sustain over time, but provides savings to the branch over Options 1 and 2.

Cons:

• The court would need to use its fund balance or other resources to address all one-time costs.

Option 4 – Deny the court's funding request

This option would not distribute any funds to the court.

Pros:

- This option would have no impact on the TCTF.
- A strict interpretation of the funding eligibility of the court based on the completion date of the facility would be maintained.

Cons:

• The court would be required to use its own resources, such as its fund balance, to address one-time and ongoing costs. While this may be possible for one-time costs, ongoing costs, especially security staffing, may be difficult to sustain over time.

Program funding history

As mentioned previously, this program existed during fiscal years 2005–2006 through 2009–2010. During that time, over half of the trial courts requested and received approval of funds for new, remodeled, or transferring facilities. The tables on the following pages in this section display, by fiscal year and court, the total amount of funding approved and distributed through this process (operational and security). Some of the approval criteria changed from year to year, which had an impact on what was approved for funding. For example, in FY 2006–2007, some security requests were approved, but only if security funding was available. It was not available with the result that only operational funding was distributed that year. As another example, in FY 2009–2010, the only funding that was approved was a limited amount of one-time operational funding. Attachment B displays all requests submitted by fiscal year and court, and breaks them into operational and security components.

Superior Court of El Dorado County's comments on their request

In addition to requesting the opportunity to review the report before its submission to the council, the court provided the following comments on its funding request:

- The AOC Finance Division has admitted and expressed their apology in their error in confirming to the court that the court and security-related operating expense funding that was approved in 2008 continued to be available beyond the June 1, 2009 deadline. The court has relied upon the AOC Finance Division's statements since March 2009 and continuing up until January 31, 2012, that the approved funding would be available for our new facility. We have relied upon this information in budgeting for court operations and this new facility. Had the court received notification in 2009 that the funding was no longer available we would have planned and budgeted accordingly.
- During the past three fiscal years the El Dorado Superior Court budget has been reduced by \$1,077,075. This is an eleven percent (11%) overall budget reduction which we have absorbed by use of our fund balance, furloughs, holding staff vacancies, reductions to court programs, services and operating expenses. For FY 2011–2012 the court's fund balance has been reduced by \$2,138,833 in order to cover court operating expenses.
- In FY 2009–2010 we held 7.90 staff vacancies, a \$592,074 salary savings; in FY 2010–2011 we held 11.50 staff vacancies, a \$920,107 salary savings; and in FY 2011–2012 we are holding 12.70 staff vacancies, a \$1,172,932 salary savings. The vacancy salary savings for each fiscal year is applied to our overall operating budget to help cover budget reductions. During the past three fiscal years our vacancy rate has increased from 8 percent to 13 percent. Our staffing levels are at a point that any further reductions will greatly impact the public's access to the court, would cause significant delays in providing services, and will have a negative impact on court staff and our community. We have limited hiring to only essential positions.
- Funding the one-time and ongoing costs for court operations and security staff at the total costs of \$312,635 has not been planned and funding has not been allocated within our budget. For the court to now fund these costs will require the court to consider further reductions in staff, implementing furloughs, eliminating additional programs, and reduction in staff benefits through bargaining. Due to the uncertainty of the FY 2012–2013 trial court funding and possible FY 2012–2013 ongoing reduction for the Superior Court of El Dorado County of \$1,095,168, the court is not in a position to cover these costs from our remaining fund balance of \$1,300,000.
- To remedy this situation, we ask the Judicial Council to approve the funding in the amount requested by the court. Court and AOC procurement staff have worked diligently to obtain the furnishings and services at a cost lower than the amount that was originally approved by the Judicial Council in 2008. Even with the court's request that the funding allocation be modified to remove the cost for a PA system and add the cost for wiring and cabling, there is a still an overall cost reduction of \$31,580.

Comments from Interested Parties

This item was not circulated for comment, as it had originally been reviewed by the Trial Court Budget Working Group and approved by the Judicial Council. The draft report was presented to the court for review and the court was given the opportunity to comment on its request. These comments are included in the previous section of the report. Staff believe that this item is subject to reconsideration by the council.

Implementation Requirements, Costs, and Operational Impacts

If either Option 1, 2, or 3 is approved, there would be an operational impact related to the security funding in that the court uses only sheriff services for provision of security. With the advent of criminal justice realignment in the current fiscal year, courts no longer have a sheriff security budget, as this funding was transferred to the county to be used solely for court security. As there is no method for transferring the recommended funding to the county, the court will need to pay the sheriff directly for their services for this facility.

If Option 1 or 2 is approved, consistent with past practices for allocations of this type, the onetime funding would not be distributed to the court until paid invoices have been submitted to and reviewed by AOC staff. Under Options 1, 2, and 3, the security funding would not be distributed until the court has notified staff that the screening station is operational, at which time funding would be prorated for the current year based on the months in operation. The full-year costs for staffing would be included in the court's base budget in FY 2012–2013.
