Executive Summary

Penal Code section 13155 requires the Judicial Council, commencing January 1, 2013, to collect information from trial courts regarding the implementation of the 2011 [Criminal Justice] Realignment Legislation and make the data available annually to the California Department of Finance (DOF), Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), and Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) by September 1. This is the fourth annual court realignment data report to the DOF, BSCC, and JLBC. The *Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2015)* is included as Attachment A to this report.

Recommendations

Staff to the Judicial Council, Criminal Justice Services office, recommends that the Judicial Council:

1. Receive the attached *Trial Courts: Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2015)* documenting information reported by the trial courts pursuant to Penal Code section 13155 and,

2. Direct staff to transmit the report to the California Department of Finance, the Board of State and Community Corrections, and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee by September 1.

Previous Council Action

The first annual report of data collected from the trial courts on the implementation of the 2011 Realignment Legislation was provided to the Judicial Council by its staff at the council's August 23, 2013, meeting. The annual reports for subsequent years were provided at the August 22, 2014, and August 21, 2015, meetings. Each report was then sent to the DOF, BSCC, and JLBC by September 1.

Methodology and Process

Penal Code section 13155 (Sen. Bill 1021; Stats. 2012, ch. 41) states that trial courts shall provide to the Judicial Council not less frequently than twice a year data that includes "statistics for each county regarding the dispositions of felonies at sentencing and petitions to revoke probation, postrelease community supervision, mandatory supervision, and, commencing July 1, 2013, parole."

Criminal Justice Realignment Data Working Group

To identify and define appropriate realignment-related data elements, an ad hoc working group of volunteers chosen by the Judicial Council's Court Executives Advisory Committee was created. This working group, the Criminal Justice Realignment Data Working Group, was composed of representatives from the superior courts of Alameda, Fresno, Los Angeles, Napa, Orange, Shasta, and Ventura Counties. The working group implemented quarterly reporting requirements and identified 29 data points to track sentencing and disposition information and court workload. After receiving feedback from the trial courts, various data points were edited and new data elements created to better track outcomes and court workload. These changes were implemented in quarter four of 2013, and no changes have been made since then. A list of current data elements is included in Attachment B.

Data collection and quality assurance

Trial courts submit data quarterly to the Judicial Council's Criminal Justice Services office using an online survey. The data reporting schedule for 2015 was as follows:

- Quarter 1 (January–March) data due April 30, 2015
- Quarter 2 (April–June) data due July 31, 2015
- Quarter 3 (July–September) data due October 31, 2015
- Quarter 4 (October–December) data due January 31, 2016

The Judicial Council staff conducts quality assurance to examine the accuracy and reliability of the data collected. Each quarter, the staff contacts trial courts to discuss data quality, provide technical assistance regarding data collection, and gather information about local court processes. Data are sometimes revised as a result of these checks. The data presented in the 2015

Court Realignment Data report may be amended in subsequent reports as courts amend previously submitted data in the event of initial data reporting errors. Data quality have continued to improve as a result of this cooperative effort and as the courts continue to refine their data reporting systems.

Policy and Cost Implications

In addition to fulfilling a legislative mandate, data collected under Penal Code section 13155 are used to assist the Trial Court Budget Advisory Committee in determining realignment funding allocations. Approximately \$27.6 million has been allocated since fiscal year 2013–2014. The current allocation formula is based on each courts' proportion of the new workload associated with realignment, as measured by the total petitions filed to revoke and/or modify postrelease community supervision and parole. All courts are able to report the data elements currently used to establish funding allocations.

Court Realignment Data (Calendar Year 2015)

This report fulfills the requirement pursuant to Penal Code section 13155 that the Judicial Council submit data regarding the implementation of the 2011 Criminal Justice Realignment Legislation to the California Department of Finance (DOF), the Board of State and Community Corrections (BSCC), and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC).

Please note the following:

- 1) Please see Attachment B for a full description of each data point reported below.
- 2) This report includes data for calendar year 2015. Many courts were implementing new case and data management systems in 2015 and encountered significant barriers to reporting throughout much of the year. In spite of these challenges, approximately 84% of the courts were able to report most (70% or more) of the requested data.
- 3) This document includes data as reported to the Judicial Council as of June 30, 2016. The data presented in the tables below may be amended in subsequent reports to complete previously submitted reports or to correct initial data reporting errors.
- 4) Note that the "n" for each data elements is the total number of courts reporting any data for that item.
