## **Invitation to Comment**

Title	Criminal Procedure: Application of Penal Code Section 654 (amend Cal. Rules of Court, rule 4.424)
Summary	The proposed amendments to rule 4.424 clarify that courts must apply Penal Code section 654 by imposing sentence on all counts and staying execution of sentence as necessary to prevent multiple punishments.

Penal Code section 654 generally proscribes multiple punishments for a single act, omission, or indivisible course of conduct. Rule 4.424 is designed to instruct courts regarding how to stay sentences under Penal Code section 654. Currently, the rule states:

Before determining whether to impose either concurrent or consecutive sentences on all counts on which the defendant was convicted, the court must determine whether the proscription in section 654 against multiple punishments for the same act or omission requires *a stay of imposition of sentence* on some of the counts. (Italics added.)

Recent case law has clarified that instead of staying *imposition* of sentence on some of the counts, courts must apply section 654 by imposing sentence on all counts and staying *execution* of sentence as necessary to prevent multiple punishments. (*People v. Alford* (2010) 180 Cal.App.4th 1463.) Because the rule instructs courts to apply section 654 by staying imposition of sentence on some of the counts, the rule is "invalid and must be revised." (*Id.* at 1473.)

The proposed amendments clarify that courts must apply section 654 by imposing sentence on all counts and staying execution of sentence as necessary to prevent multiple punishments.

Rule 4.424 of the California Rules of Court would be amended effective January 1, 2011, to read:

## Rule 4.424. Consideration of applicability of section 654

Before determining whether to impose either concurrent or consecutive sentences on all counts on which the defendant was convicted, the court must determine whether the proscription in section 654 against multiple punishments for the same act or omission requires a stay of imposition execution of the sentence imposed on some of the counts.
