Executive Summary

Office of Court Research staff recommend that the Judicial Council's Executive and Planning Committee confirm the conversion of five vacant subordinate judicial officer (SJO) positions in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County. The court has notified council staff of these vacancies and has requested that the positions be converted to judgeships. Confirming this request for SJO conversions is consistent with established council policy of improving access to justice by providing constitutionally empowered judges who are accountable to the electorate in matters that are appropriately handled by judges.

Recommendation

Office of Court Research staff recommend that the Executive and Planning Committee (E&P) confirm the conversion of five vacant SJO positions in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County. The vacancies are the result of the elevation of the commissioners serving in these positions to judgeships on October 11, 2018. The conversions will take effect on the date on which E&P approves the court's request.

Council staff also recommend that E&P acknowledge that the Superior Court of Los Angeles County may treat these converted positions as positions that the court may temporarily fill until judges are named and sworn to fill them.

Relevant Previous Council Action

The 2002 report of the Subordinate Judicial Officer Working Group led the Judicial Council to sponsor legislation to restore an appropriate balance between judges and SJOs in the trial courts. The 2002 report found that many courts had created SJO positions out of necessity in response to the dearth in the creation of new judgeships during the 1980s and 1990s. As a result, many SJOs were working as temporary judges. This imbalance between judges and SJOs was especially critical in the area of family and juvenile law.¹

In 2007, the Judicial Council approved a methodology for evaluating the workload appropriate to SJOs relative to the number of SJOs working in the courts. In the same year, the Legislature passed Assembly Bill 159 (Stats. 2007, ch. 722), which adopted the Judicial Council's methodology. This resulted in a list of 25 courts in which a total of 162 SJO positions would be converted. Government Code section 69615(c)(1)(A) allows for the annual conversion of up to 16 SJO vacancies upon authorization by the Legislature in courts identified by the Judicial Council as having SJOs in excess of the workload appropriate to SJOs.²

Subsequent council action established and refined guidelines for expediting the conversion of SJO vacancies. These guidelines included:

- The adoption of four trial court allocation groups and a schedule that distributes the 16 annual SJO conversions across these groups in numbers that are proportional to the total number of conversions for which the groups are eligible;
- The delegation of authority to E&P for confirming SJO conversions;
- The establishment of guidelines for courts to notify the council of SJO vacancies and timelines for the redistribution of SJO conversions across the allocation groups; and

• The establishment of criteria for E&P to use in evaluating and granting requests by courts to exempt SJO vacancies from conversion.³

In addition to the above policies to expedite conversions, in 2015 the council refreshed the workload data used to determine the courts with eligible conversions. A list of eligible positions was established for the remaining conversions, and courts were notified of any changes in status based on the updated workload assessment.⁴

Analysis/Rationale

The Superior Court of Los Angeles County is eligible for a total of 79 of the 162 conversions authorized by the Legislature and has previously converted 69 positions, with the last conversion occurring on August 28 of the current fiscal year (FY 2018–19). The Superior Court of Los Angeles County is the sole member of Allocation Group 1, which is allotted 7 conversions each year. The confirmation of the present request would result in the conversion of 6 of the 7 SJO positions for which the court is eligible in FY 2018–19, the court having converted one SJO position earlier in the year. Confirming these positions would allow the court reasonable certainty and clarity concerning staffing and judicial workload over the next few years.

Policy implications

Confirming these conversions is consistent with well-established tenets of council policy on SJO conversions.

Comments

This proposal, which is consistent with council policy on SJO conversions, did not circulate for comment.

Alternatives considered

The proposed conversion of five vacant SJO positions in the Superior Court of Los Angeles County is consistent with council policy. On that basis, no alternatives were considered.

Fiscal and Operational Impacts

To date, there have been minimal implementation costs for the trial courts. On appointment of a new judge to sit in a converted position, funding equal to the judge's estimated compensation— which includes salary and benefits but does not include retirement—is removed from the trial

<u>Summary:</u>	This proposal would adopt an amendment to the <i>Conflict of Interest Code for the</i> <i>Judicial Council of California</i> (Code) to: (1) remove office names from the list of designated classifications and consolidate the Leadership Services Division, Operations & Programs Division, and Administrative Division into an All Divisions category for the designated classifications; and (2) add classifications to the list of designated classifications. the confidential information of minors and to preserve paper notice of specified proceedings. The bill also requires affirmative consent to electronic service as of January 1, 2019. These statutory changes require the modifications to rules and forms recommended in this report.

18-202 Civil Practice and Procedure: Name Change and Gender Change Forms (Action Required)

Summary:The Civil and Small Claims Advisory Committee recommends adopting and revising
various Judicial Council Name Change forms to reflect recently enacted legislative
amendments that go into effect January 1, 2019. Assembly Bill 3250 adds new
requirements for issuance and service of orders to show cause in certain name change
and gender change proceedings initiated by parents or guardians, as well as requiring
new judicial findings in gender change proceedings brought by guardians. Assembly
Bill 2201 adds a new category of petitioners (those seeking to avoid human
trafficking) to those who may seek confidential name changes. The advisory
committee recommends that the forms be revised, and two additional forms adopted
without circulation so that the forms will be correct under the new laws when they
become effective.

Protective Orders: Gun Violence Restraining Order Forms (Action Required)

The Civil and Small Claims Advisory Committee recommends revising various Judicial Council gun violence restraining order (GVRO) forms to reflect recently enacted legislative amendments that go into effect January 1, 2019. Recently enacted Senate Bill 1200 (Stats. 2018, ch. 898) prescribes that orders pursuant to Penal Code section 18100 et seq. shall be referred to as gun violence restraining orders, expands the definition of ammunition to include a magazine, prohibits a filing fee for GVRO forms and documents, requires a law enforcement officer to make a specific request when serving a gun violence restraining order, and provides that parties do not need to pay the sheriff for service of a GVRO. The bill also requires a court hearing within 21 days of issuing an emergency protective order to determine if a restraining order after notice and hearing should be issued. The advisory committee recommends that the mandatory forms be revised by January 1, 2019, so that the mandatory forms will be in compliance with the new laws when they become effective.

18-197Judicial Branch Technology: Information Security FrameworkUpdate (Action Required)

Summary:The Judicial Council Technology Committee (JCTC) recommends approval of
revisions to the Judicial Branch Information Security Framework. The original
framework was approved by the Judicial Council in June 2014 with the
understanding that it would require periodic updates. This revision cycle is focused on
updates to make the document easier to use and on the addition of privacy controls
specified in recently updated federal standards.

<u>18-199</u>	Jury Instructions: New, Revised, and Revoked Civil Jury Instructions (Action Required)
<u>Summary:</u>	The Advisory Committee on Civil Jury Instructions recommends approving for publication the new, revised, revoked, and renumbered civil jury instructions prepared by the committee. These revisions bring the instructions up to date with developments in the law over the previous six months. On Judicial Council approval, the instructions will be published in the official 2019 edition of the <i>Judicial Council of California Civil Jury Instructions (CACI)</i> .
<u>18-206</u>	Uniform Bail and Penalty Schedules: 2019 Edition (Action Required)
<u>Summary:</u>	The Traffic Advisory Committee proposes revisions to the Uniform Bail and Penalty Schedules, 2019 Edition, to become effective January 1, 2019. The 2019 proposal includes: (1) recommendations based on new legislation, as required under Vehicle Code section 40310 and Penal Code section 1269b (2) recommended changes to the Fish and Game Schedule by the Department of Fish and Wildlife, and (3) miscellaneous technical additions and corrections.
<u>18-205</u>	Traffic: Selection of Online Traffic Adjudication Pilot Project Expansion Courts (Action Required)
<u>Summary:</u>	The Budget Act of 2018-19 appropriated \$3.4 million in new operational funding and \$1.3 million in ongoing funds to support and expand on the Judicial Council's partnership with five superior courts initially funded by a U.S. Department of Justice grant to enhance processes for ability-to-pay determinations for traffic infraction fines and fees and adjudicating cases online. The act authorizes the Judicial Council to select at least eight courts to expand the Online Traffic Adjudication Pilot Project and further test and develop ability-to-pay and other online adjudication functions. Judicial Council staff request the Council's approval of the proposed court selection, adding three additional courts to join the five already involved in the pilot.
<u>18-194</u>	Trial Court Allocations: Trial Court Trust Fund Funds Held on Behalf of the Trial Courts (Action Required)
<u>Summary:</u>	The Trial Court Budget Advisory Committee's Fiscal Planning Subcommittee recommends that the Judicial Council approve two new requests and three amended requests from five trial courts for Trial Court Trust Fund funds to be held on behalf of the trial courts. Under the Judicial Council-adopted process, courts may request funding reduced as a result of a court's exceeding the 1 percent fund balance cap, to be retained in the Trial Court Trust Fund for the benefit of that court.
<u>18-204</u>	Trial Courts: Recidivism Reduction Fund Court Grant Program: Annual Report, 2018 (Action Required)
<u>Summary:</u>	The Criminal Justice Services office recommends that the Judicial Council receive the <i>Recidivism Reduction Fund Court Grant Program: Annual Report, 2018</i> ; direct the Administrative Director to submit this annual report to the Joint Legislative Budget

Committee and the Department of Finance as mandated by the Budget Act of 2015 (Assem. Bill 93, Stats. 2015, ch. 10).

<u>18-196</u>	Report to the Legislature: Statewide Collection of Delinquent
	Court-Ordered Debt for 2017-18 (Action Required)

Summary:Judicial Council staff recommend approval of the Statewide Collection of
Court-Ordered Debt for Fiscal year 2017-18 for transmittal to the Legislature.
Penal Code section 1463.010(c) requires the Judicial Council to report the extent to
which each court or county collections program is following best practices, the
programs' performance, and any changes necessary to improve performance of
collection programs statewide.

Additionally, as stated in the October 2018 report to the Department of Finance (DOF) and the Joint Legislative Budget Committee (JLBC) per Government Code section 68514, this report contains revised or additional information from programs that did not submit data, or submitted incomplete data for inclusion in the October 1 report.
