



Judicial Branch Budget Snapshot Superior Court of California County of Tuolumne

Key Budget Challenges/Priorities

- In spite of operational efficiencies, a structural deficit exists and staffing levels will be reduced via layoffs in FY 2013-14 if funding is not restored or labor contracts concessions cannot be negotiated.
- All projects to improve delivery of service and enhance efficiencies have stalled if there is a cost attached. Court cannot fully automate minute orders in all courtrooms, upgrade the phone system, or contract for payroll services.

Budget Impacts

General Budget Reduction Impacts to the Public

- Public has been impacted by reduced and interrupted service delivery caused by inadequate staffing levels in every court division
- Restraining orders are no longer returned the same day, but within 24 hours; files are archived offsite and retrieved only once per week

Reduced Public Access: Self-Help/Mediator/Facilitator Services

 Family law facilitator is contracted for only 12 hours per week (Thursday afternoons and Fridays only), resulting in increased wait times for assistance and appointments scheduled weeks out

Reduced Public Access: Court Reporters/Interpreters

- Court reporter position vacated due to retirement in FY2011-12 remains unfilled due to budget reductions
- Court has no interpreters on staff and no resources to certify staff; interpreters must brought in from out of county at a premium cost

Reduced Public Access: Public Service Counters and Clerks

 Public hours reduced to 8am to 3pm daily to complete processing and meet court deadlines and calendars, causing longer lines as public rushes to meet the earlier closing time

Closures: Courtrooms and Courthouses

• No courtroom closures have occurred and none are anticipated

Staff Reductions: Furloughs, Layoffs, Unfilled Vacancies

- Over the past 5 years, 12.5 vacant positions have not been filled due to budget reductions, resulting in a vacancy rate of 26% in FY2011-12
- All staff were furloughed 10 days in FY2009-10, 12 days in FY2010-11, 18 days in FY2011-12, and 5 days in FY2012-13

Impacts: Court Security Services

For the past 4 years, the County Sheriff has been unable to assign the
perimeter security deputies provided for in the Court/County MOU due
to funding or recruitment/retention issues

Fewer Judicial Officers

- Court is still setting hearings within statutorily required timeframes, but calendars are increasing in size, causing longer wait times in court
- Jury failure to appear notices have been eliminated
