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#### Issue

The Expedited Jury Trial Act (Assem. Bill 2284 [Evans]; Stats. 2010, ch. 674) (AB 2284) went into effect on January 1, 2011, as did new rules of court to implement court procedures for the shorter trials. In order to speed up jury selection in expedited jury trials, Cal. Rules of Court, rule 3.1548 was adopted, limiting voir dire time allotted to each side and encouraging parties to submit a joint form questionnaire to be used with prospective jurors. A proposed optional juror questionnaire form has been developed to be used in such cases.

#### **Discussion**

The goal of the new expedited jury trial procedures is to complete a trial in a single court day, if possible. The rules adopted by the Judicial Council include limitations on the time to be spent in selecting a jury, with each side limited to 15 minutes of voir dire. The rule also encourages the use of a form juror questionnaire with prospective jurors in order to expedite the voir dire process. (Cal. Rules of Court, rule 3.1549.) The parties are encouraged to agree in advance to the content of such a questionnaire and to submit it to the court as part of the pretrial submissions to be considered by the court at the pretrial conference. (Rule 3.1548(b)(5) and (f)(7).) The proposed juror questionnaire, with only a single page of questions, has been developed to assist parties in this process.

The first page of the proposed questionnaire, introduction and instructions for the jurors, is based on the instruction page in *Juror Questionnaire for Civil Cases* (form MC-001, page A).

The second page, the one-page questionnaire itself, differs in length and detail from the general civil questionnaire, which is four pages long, with an additional page for use in personal injury cases. The questionnaire seeks information regarding the prospective juror's age, residence, number of children, if any, and type of car owned. It asks for occupation and place of employment for the prospective juror and any adults living with him or her. The form inquires into the educational background of the juror. It also asks if the prospective juror has served on a jury before, been involved in a lawsuit, or has experience in areas that might involve lawsuits (claims evaluation, law, law enforcement, accident reconstruction, or medicine). It asks how the juror gets news and information.

At the bottom of the form there is a verification and signature line, using the same language as in *Juror Questionnaire for Civil Cases* (form MC-001, page E).

# **JUROR QUESTIONNAIRE**

### **Introduction and Instructions**

Thank you for coming to court as a potential juror. Before the case can start, a jury must be selected. The judge and the people involved in the case need to know something about you in order to select jurors who can be fair to both sides.

Everyone has attitudes and opinions that are shaped by their life experiences. Sometimes these experiences can make it difficult to look at a certain issue in an unbiased and unemotional way. As a juror, you must return a verdict based on the law and on the facts proved in court, not on emotion or on other views not supported by the evidence. The judge will give you instructions on the law and on how you should go about deciding the case. You must listen to and follow the judge's instructions.

The questions on this form are designed to help the court and the lawyers learn something about your background and your views on issues that may be related to this case. The questions are asked not to invade your privacy, but to make sure that you can be a fair and impartial juror. If there is any reason why you might not be able to give both sides a fair trial in this case, it is important that you say so.

The judge has decided to use this form to save time and to give you a chance to tell the court and the lawyers about yourself.

If there is anything you do not want to talk about in open court, please circle the question number. After you have finished the questionnaire, let the clerk know that you have circled one or more question numbers.

Do not write on the back of any page. Use an additional sheet of paper.

If you are called to the jury box, your answers to this questionnaire become a matter of public record, just as if you had answered the questions aloud in the courtroom.

If you have trouble reading, understanding, or filling out this form, please let the court clerk know.

PLEASE REMEMBER THAT YOU ARE ANSWERING THESE QUESTIONS UNDER PENALTY OF PERJURY. YOUR ANSWERS MUST BE TRUE AND COMPLETE. THANK YOU FOR YOUR HELP IN SELECTING A FAIR JURY.
