
50 of 58 Counties Will Unify

Lassen Latest to Join List

assen is the latest county to join the ■growing list of courts that have voted to unify. With Lassen, the number of counties that have voted to unify their trial courts into a single countywide superior court now totals 50, the

Judicial Council reports. To date, 47 of the 50 unifications are in effect. San Diego's effective unification date is December 1; San Francisco's and Lassen's is December 31. Votes in two counties— Kern and Los Angeles—did not pass.

Prop. 220, passed by 64 percent of voters statewide in the June 2 election. amends the state Constitution to permit the superior and municipal court judges within a county to create a "unified," or single, superior court if a majority of both the superior and the municipal court judges so vote. The California Rules of Court allow courts to call for a vote every six months through December 1999 and once every 12 months after that. More frequent voting re-
