Budget and Program Priorities for FY 2014-15

Promoting access to justice with minimal means by increasing court services available on-line and at off-site facilities; increasing self-help services that offer 'turn-key' instructions and information to the general unrepresented public; and increasing the availability of multi-lingual court information.

Reduction in Public Services

- Closed three courthouses and 12.4 courtrooms
- Reduced public service hours
- Forced to shift high-volume case types (traffic, small claims) to facilities ill-equipped to handle long lines, congestion, and delays
- Ceased answering traffic-related questions at public counters and stopped answering traffic phones

Availability of Judicial Officers

Currently have 76 judicial officers to process the caseload of 136 judges (deficit of 62 judges)

Funding/Contracts

Without the ability to carry over more than 1% of reserves, the court's Information Technology infrastructure will be severely hampered, especially since the court must automate court services in light of diminished resources. Most notably, continuing or entering into planned contracts to upgrade video technology. courtroom efficiencies, and on-line court services will not be possible.

Court Security / Safety / Facilities

Shifting cases to other court locations creates the potential for security risks inherent with lack of adequate space, public flow, and potential conflicts with witnesses, family members, and litigants.
